DIOCESAN PRESIDENT – Lynn Lavictoire

NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION.

September 30 was a beautiful day to spend outside and participate in the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. One particular event was hosted by Beechwood Cemetery Foundation in partnership with the Project of Heart, the Assembly of Seven Generations, and the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society. The purpose was to help people learn about residential schools and other forms of colonialism and motivate the changes proposed by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action.

Throughout the day, there were several different activities for people to participate in. One was the Reconciling History walking tour hosted by Indigenous tour guides bringing people to the grave sites of various historical figures who played historical roles in the residential school system. One of the first places we visited, for example, was the grave of Duncan Campbell Scott who used the term "final solution" in describing government policy towards Indigenous people. This included ignoring the health abuses that led to the high rate of tuberculosis among Indigenous children in the residential school system documented in a report published in 1907.

The report was written by Dr. Peter Henderson Bryce, the Chief Medical Officer for the Department of Indian Affairs. The fallout from the report got Dr. Bryce removed from the department. Decades later he was be recognized as an early and courageous advocate for improved health standards for residential schools. By all the flowers and decoration that adorn his grave stone, it is clear that Dr. Bryce is well respected and honoured by Indigenous people for all the efforts he made to help them.



Storytelling and a video were also on the day's agenda. Both featured Spirit Bear whose adventures are intended to help people of all ages learn from history on living better together. The video, for example, was a stop-motion animation film that tells the story of Spirit Bear hopping on a train to Ottawa and banding together with children and animals to end injustice against First Nations children.

The highlight of the day was the display of numerous mosaics totaling 57,000 tiles made by children and youth from schools all across Canada to honour the children of the residential schools. These



mosaics were laid out as a memory labyrinth to highlight the historical and contemporary truths of Indigenous people and their relationship with Canada. It was very touching to reflect on all the hard work and love these school children poured into their artwork in support of reconciliation.

Overall, it was an amazing day and uplifting to see all the other people who attended in support of their Indigenous sisters and brothers. I definitely look forward to attending this event next year!

WHAT IS A GIFT?

Every December, and sometimes in the months before, people make lists, ask questions of those they love and care for, and what is all this mental activity for? We want to make sure that the gift we buy is one that will make the recipient happy and show in a tangible way our love for them! Sometimes the gifts received are not what the recipient wants or needs, and then they are put aside to be re-gifted the following Christmas to someone else. A gift should not be wasted!

The dictionary describes the word gift as (n) "The transfer of something without the expectation of payment," and "A natural ability." In 1 Corinthians 12:4-11 we read of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit:

There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit gives them. There are different ways of serving, but the same Lord is served. There are different abilities to perform service, but the same God gives ability to everyone for their particular service. The Spirit's presence is shown in some way in each person for the good of all. The Spirit gives one person a message of wisdom, while to another person the same Spirit gives a message full of knowledge. One and the same Spirit gives faith to one person, while to another person he gives the power to heal. The Spirit gives one person he gives the power to heal. The Spirit gives one person the same service; to another, the gift of speaking God's message; and to yet another, the ability to tell the difference between gifts that come from the Spirit and those that do not. To one person he gives the ability to speak in strange tongues, and to another he gives the ability to explain what is said. But it is one and the same Spirit who does all this; as he wishes, he gives a different gift to each person.

These gifts are freely given to us, but it is solely our decision as to whether we use them or not.

As members of The Catholic Women's League of Canada, we recite this line in the League Prayer "Teach us to share with others at home and abroad, the good things You have given us." In other words, help us to share the gifts that have been bestowed on us with those with whom we come into contact with and those that we may never meet. Many members share their gifts with their fellow parishioners, working in Liturgy, Hospitality, Education, Committee work etc. There are those whose special expertise is in creating crafts, art work, beautifying the church environment. Another aift is that of fundraising for specific causes, the ability of engaging others to help further a cause. In July the Ottawa Diocesan CWL Council will have the honour of hosting the 2022 Provincial Annual Meeting of Members. As you can appreciate, this is no small undertaking and a committee of many members has been formed, each member sharing her own special gift for the benefit of all. Here's a sampling of a few requests: "May I please have two shawls for two siblings that are postoperative and haven't spoken in 25 years!" It was reported back to us that they are talking to each other and the whole family as well! May God be praised!

Another couple was given shawls after the death of their two-day old son. Those shawls brought some warmth into all their grief.

Other recipients are postoperative or preparing for surgery. There are also chemo therapy patients, those dealing with deaths of spouses or children, or living with old age debilitation. It feels so good to come with one's hands full of prayer and something tangible, like a prayer shawl to express your compassion. We try to meet the needs of each person where they're at. We fill requests

everywhere they are needed. Miraculously, the dedicated knitters always manage to stay ahead of the demand! There is no expectation of payment whatsoever, but offerings are gratefully accepted to keep supplies topped up when as needed.

Our Heavenly Mamma of Good Counsel is surely helping us along in our endeavours to meet the suffering Christ on the path of life and enfold Him in our loving embrace. The Prayer Shawl says: "I see Your suffering and I care!"

THE RECYCLE & REUSE PROGRAM

REDUCE, REPAIR, RENEW, REPURPOSE

During a Catholic Women's League Meeting in the early days of our council being reactivated (January 2012), it was suggested that we check out making sleeping mats out of the colorful plastic milk bags. Somehow, I became the coordinator and I treasure each day. We researched the idea and learned what a wonderful activity it was that we could help the homeless around the world who were sleeping on the ground and we could lessen the amount of plastic going to our landfill sites at the same time. A real "win, win" situation!

This program changed our "spare time," and we are more aware of the meaning of Pope Francis' words in his Laudato Si', On Care for Our Common Home (2015), "Every effort to protect and improve our world entails profound changes in lifestyles, models of production and consumption." Pope Francis is inspired by Saint Francis who was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast.



After a short period of time, we added more items to support six beneficiaries. Our beneficiaries are:

<u>Clifford Bowey Public School</u>, who turn the aluminum from the pop tabs into funds for their students with severe developmental disabilities.

<u>Miriam Care Centre</u>, who support pregnant mothers who are in difficulties through the sale of used postage stamps.

Lions Club Eyeglass Recycle Plant, who provide eyeglasses to the vision impaired in developing countries.

Victoria Quilts Inc., who sew quilts for cancer patients.

<u>Eco-Equitable</u>, who teach new immigrants to acquire skills to obtain sustainable financial independence.

<u>Canadian Food for Children</u> who ship the sleeping mats. They are now shipping our candles that are used for heat and light in villages that do not have those services.

Our partners include: churches, schools, senior's clubs, Knights of Columbus, retired businessmen clubs, an upholsterer, City of Ottawa employees, women's business groups, neighbors, friends, relatives as well as the Catholic Women's League Councils in the Ottawa Diocese and even farther afield.

We are privileged to connect with many cities, towns and villages in our Province including: Smiths Falls, Toronto, Arnprior, Combermere, Carleton Place, Russell, Embrun, Limoges, Casselman, Kanata, Stittsville, Mississauga, and Kingston to name just a few!

Our volunteers not only collect items but some will process the stamps, or weave the milk bags, or deliver locally, or deliver to other areas, sew cushions, crush cans, and sort eyeglasses. I'm hoping to not only donate wax candles (new this year) but to make new candles. Our volunteers pick one or more activity that interests them. What a team! Won't you consider an item that interests you?

As coordinator, I have the joy of meeting so many wonderful people. Also, I get to organize everybody; conduct presentations and workshops, find drivers, schedule pick-ups and deliveries. The best tools are the telephone, computer and word of mouth. We don't have a Webpage or a budget and we have continued through the pandemic adhering to all the protocols. Most of the time our garage is full of items waiting to be delivered. When I hear an echo out there, I know we are in good shape!



As I write this (before the end of 2021), our statistics are pretty impressive: We have shipped over 600 sleeping mats; over 500 eyeglasses; delivered boxes of stamps; heavy bags of material; over 317 pounds of pop tabs; and boxes of bread tags and even three boxes of candles. And that was in our spare time?

(The Provincial total for 2021 of Sleeping Mats shipped is a little over 6,000!)

We'd love to have You and your council if you haven't already become involved. So, please take a moment to consider learning

more. This is the easiest program to be involved in. With a little effort together, we can create even greater results.

Works of Mercy and Prayers

Just a tip for those who would like to try a bake sale – we advertised in the bulletin for two weeks in advance and we had a lot of phone calls to reserve tins of cookies. That was very helpful.

Our next endeavor? A Valentine's Day bake sale and the goods can be anything. Besides Diane's fudge, Nancy's buns are the best in town. Always a fight to the front of the line when Nancy brings her buns! Butterscotch pies anyone? Yum! And more delicious cookies.
